The Chilliwack Metropolitan Orchestra Chilliwack's community orchestra, was founded in 2008 by local volunteer musicians who were dedicated to performing high quality symphony concerts for patrons of the eastern Fraser Valley. Over past seasons we have presented some of the very best in guest soloists including Dr. Robert Silverman, Jennifer Lim, Dr. Janice Fehlauer, Dr. Sarah Davis Buechner and operatic soprano, Siobhan Raupach.

We have also presented innovative collaborations with other musical organizations such as Beatles Tribute group, *The Fab Fourever*, *Philomusica Chorus* and members of the *Chilliwack Players Guild*.

We make it possible to attend our concert programs featuring concertos with world-class soloists and full symphonies without needing to leave our community. We also endeavour to perform one program of modern-day music each season.

Did you Know...?

The Sleigh Ride by Leopold Mozart features a natural trumpet (often referred to as a Baroque trumpet). It is a **long, double-folded trumpet without valves**. It was the trumpet used across Europe from the 15th through the mid-19th centuries, and is a common ancestor to all modern brass instruments. Historically, the natural trumpet was used as a military instrument to facilitate communication (e.g. break camp, retreat, etc.).

In 1906, composer Gustav Holst composed a setting of Christina Rossetti's poem "Cranham," now known as <u>In the Bleak Midwinter</u>, for *The English Hymnal*. Today it is performed throughout the world.

The <u>Cherry Tree Carol</u> relates an apocryphal story of the Virgin Mary, presumably while traveling to Bethlehem with Joseph for the census. In the most popular version, the two stop in a cherry orchard, and Mary asks her husband to pick cherries for her, because she is hungry. Joseph spitefully tells Mary to let the child's father pick her cherries. At this point in most versions, the infant Jesus, from the womb, speaks to the tree and commands it to lower a branch down to Mary, which it does. Joseph, witnessing this miracle, immediately repents his harsh words.

Holly, especially the variety found in Europe, is commonly referenced at Christmas time, and is often referred to by the name "Christ's thorn." Since medieval times the plant has carried a Christian symbolism as expressed in the popular Christmas carol, <u>The Holly and the Ivy</u>, where the holly represents Jesus and the ivy represents His mother, Mary.

A 16th century carol originating from Coventry, <u>The Coventry Carol</u> was traditionally performed during Coventry "Mystery Plays," which were medieval plays enacting New Testament Stories, including that of the Nativity.

Gregory Douglas Johnson

Now returning for his eighth season as Artistic Director of the Chilliwack Metropolitan Orchestra, Gregory Douglas Johnson is grateful to be once again performing at public concerts. His performances have been described as

containing "great feeling and nuance" (Ukrainian Canadian Herald) and audiences are quick to respond to his connection with the music. Born and raised in the Fraser Valley, his conducting pursuits have taken him as far as the Czech Republic, but he maintains his family life here. He has had the opportunity to work with esteemed conductors such as Larry Rachleff, Gustav Meier and Kirk Trevor. During his orchestral conducting training in Winnipeg, he had the rare opportunity to conduct the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra and the St. John's Chamber Orchestra, in addition to his work with the University Orchestra and Wind Ensemble. Equally at home in choral and wind ensemble conducting, he is in his ninth season as Music Director of the Fraser Valley Community Winds, and maintains an awardwinning choir at Woodward Hill Elementary in Surrey. He has worked with students of all ages, holding concurrent flute instructor posts at Trinity Western University and the Langley Community Music School. His family of two effervescent children, Gabriel and Josephine, and his wife Jacqueline, enjoy spending quality time together, particularly in nature.

Dr. Ralph Jones has been a Chilliwack Players Guild actor for 15 years, starting in a pantomime as the "Pink Fairy" in *Cinderella Up the Beanstalk*.

This was followed by several more pantomimes and regular appearances at the Players Guild British Nights. Serious plays included Agatha Christie's *Witness for the Prosecution*, as the Judge. A few musicals should be mentioned, including *Nunsense* as well as
